## **“Bumper Cars”**

1 Peter 4:6: *“For this is why the gospel was preached even to those who are dead, that through judged in the flesh the way people are, they might live in the spirit the way God does.”*

Have you ever driven a bumper car? If so, can you recall the way it felt to go after another car and try to ram into them to get that sensation of a collision? Do you recall that as long as it was done it fun by all parties, it was a great way to interact with one another? Yet, it could become maddening when you were in the car that was hit all the time and you couldn't get anywhere in the rink because you kept being rammed by others. The roadblocks became too much to handle and the jostling of bumps actually became an irritant that you quickly wanted to end.

Maybe you haven't even been in a bumper car. Maybe you weren't eager to put yourself in harm's way from the other drivers to use you as a target to come into aggressive contact with. Perhaps you don't like the physical abrasions. No matter. You still understand the concept of the game and you have seen the bumper car rinks especially at carnivals in years past.

I bring up this imagery as a way to ignite the imagination in our minds with the scriptures from 1st Peter and our lives. People are very interesting and many times we are so different and yet the same that it is perplexing. Most of us enjoy fun and games, like the type at carnivals. Yet, there are times when too much is too much and we need a break, like with the bumper cars and being rammed into over and over again. Being a good sport is part of life, like when our parents told us that we need to learn how to be good losers and gracious winners. Those lessons seem like they are fading in our present day society. With the changes in society and our mindsets, we tend to be people who really don't know how to reach one another. It has become a lonely and aggressive place in many regards.

This may not be true for you and your world, and for this I am thankful. However, for a large part of us, this world is like a rink of bumper cars with our daily interactions with people who must deal with, live alongside of, navigate and negotiate with for personal and business affairs. This stress of having the contact of bumps with the emotional distance of seeing the other as an object to conquer and defeat in one way or another has become a game of sport in our society. This disconnection from direct connection has left us with an imbalance in how to build and nurture human society for the common good and welfare of our present day needs. We are people who are in need of hugs and we have been conditioned to give ramming bumps instead. It is no wonder God's love is crucified awaiting the resurrection of Jesus to come and deliver us from our broken state of lovelessness.

God calls us to be good mindful drivers who are observant and caring out on the roads. We are to be mindful of safety and courtesy of the roads and the regulations we are to follow for the ordering and efficiency of society for those who inhabit it with us. Bumper cars are only good in fun and sport of the rinks they are confined to with the willing participants with their consent and equal participation. Simply put: we are people who are called to live in God's love both giving and receiving for the wholeness in our lives to be found for reality, not fun and games. Healing comes when we make direct connections and emotional relations. To do this effectively and with realness, we must take away the rubber guards we have and let the real connection of others become a friend. The only way to heal is outside of the bumper car rink. May God add spirit and understanding within for the message of truth we are to receive and live. Thank you for listening.

Our mission for this month is the Strengthen the Church special offering. The 35th General Synod of the United Church of Christ will be held in Kansas City, Missouri, from July 11-15. Our Heartland Conference Minister, The Rev. Dr. David Long-Higgins, is asking for financial support for the 68 delegates (of a total 675) who will represent us at this important conference. After registration, the cost for each delegate is \$1,465. Our conference pays the registration fees, and a stipend is given to each delegate. However, the stipend provided by the conference does not cover the expenses each delegate must pay. Our financial help, as well as our prayers for our delegates, is needed to help with the cost of attending this important gathering. 
## **TRUSTEES**
