We will plan to have the sessions go for 8-12 weeks. Yet, depending upon discussion and the material content, we might make adjustments. Our start date is scheduled for March 12th at 1pm.

In his first major work since *The Universal Christ*, one of our most prominent spiritual voices offers a wholehearted and hope-filled model for the world today, grounded in the timeless wisdom of the Hebrew prophets.

How do we live compassionately in a time of violence and despair? What can we do with our private disappointments and the anger we feel in such an unjust world?
